

Creating Screencasts to Deliver Content Online

So, what is screencast? A screencast is a recording of your computer screen, of the screen of your phone or tablet, which, more often than not, is accompanied by an audio narration. So, when a user is watching one of your screencasts, they are watching a video that you made yourself of what was happening on your computer screen at any particular point in time and listening to you speak over those images about what they are watching. It is basically another type of instructional video.

Screencasts are great for so many things. They can be used for showing students how to navigate your online module; provide a quick tutorial on how to use specific functionality in a piece of software; and explain a particularly difficult topic or concept via PowerPoint for example.
