At Technological University Dublin (TU Dublin), our motto is Infinite Possibilities, which highlights not only the range of academic programmes offered by the University, it also reflects the enormous potential and opportunity that lies ahead as you embark on the next chapter of your life.

Our University has a diverse student population, with over 29,000 students from over 100 countries across our five facilities - Aungier Street, Blanchardstown, Bolton Street, Grangegorman and Tallaght. Inclusion is one of our core values, so it is important that all our students feel welcome here.

EXCITING DEVELOPMENTS ON CAMPUS

Two new buildings in Grangegorman are now open and ready to welcome 10,000 students for the new academic year. The development is the largest investment in Higher Education in the Irish state for a century, with the new East and Central Quads bringing together many of our teaching and research activities in one vibrant, cutting-edge campus. The Central Quad, the largest building on the campus, is home to students of Science; Culinary Arts; Tourism; Health, and Electrical & Electronic Engineering. The East Quad, located beside the Broadstone Luas stop, is a Cultural Hub for the campus and the city. The building accommodates the disciplines of Creative Arts and Design; Music and Drama; Social Sciences; Media, and Law.

On our Blanchardstown Campus, the newly developed Connect building has brought our academic management and student services teams together, enabling us to take a more holistic approach to any academic and personal issues affecting our students. Construction is also beginning on an additional teaching facility with open, flexible spaces that will support the University's practice-led teaching ethos.

On our Tallaght Campus, a new Sports, Science and Health building, due for completion in 2022, will provide students with state-of-the-art teaching, research, laboratory and recreation facilities. Construction will also commence on a new multi-disciplinary building for teaching and research in Hospitality, Culinary Arts, Engineering and Apprenticeship activities.

Unfortunately, it wasn't possible to welcome you to our campuses last year, but as restrictions ease, we look forward to meeting you at one of our Open Days that take place throughout the year. TU Dublin has multiple locations across the Dublin region, with campuses in Blanchardstown and Tallaght and Dublin City Centre. Our new campus at Grangegorman, which is the largest investment in Higher Education in Europe, brings together many of our city-centre activities. Together with our campuses in Bolton Street, Blanchardstown, Aungier Street and Tallaght, Grangegorman provides a welcoming working environment where students and staff can explore their abilities and reach their full potential.

The current development phase at Grangegorman saw the East Quad open in late 2020, while the Central Quad began welcoming small numbers of students from April 2021.



EAST QUAD - A CULTURAL HUB FOR THE CITY

The East Quad, located just across from the main Rathdown entrance to the campus, is a Cultural Hub not only for the Grangegorman campus but also for the city. Students can access the East Quad directly via the Broadstone Gate, a new public plaza that links the Broadstone Luas stop on the Green Line to TU Dublin.

East Quad is home to students of:

- Creative Arts
- ~ Design
- Music
- Social Sciences
- ∼ Drama
- ~ Media
- ~ Law

The fluid nature of the building's design and the vibrancy of the learning environment facilitates exhibitions of students' visual artwork and dramatic and musical performances in the 400-seat Concert Hall, 80-seat Black Box Theatre and 80-seat Recital Hall. The design of the external spaces creates opportunities for performance, film projection and the exhibition of sculpture.



CENTRAL QUAD - THE HEART OF THE CAMPUS

The Central Quad is the largest building on the new campus. It is now the new home for all six schools of the College of Sciences & Health (formerly located in Kevin Street), as well as two schools from the College of Arts & Tourism (formerly located in Cathal Brugha Street), and one school from the College of Engineering & Built Environment (which was formerly located in Kevin Street):

- Biological Sciences
- Chemical and Pharmaceutical Sciences
- Computer Science
- → Food Science and Environmental Health
- Mathematical Sciences
- Physics & Clinical & Optometric Sciences (including the National Optometry Centre)
- Culinary Arts and Food Technology
- Hospitality Management and Tourism
- Electrical and Electronic Engineering

If you're due to take up your studies in the Central Quad, you can expect to learn in a world-class educational environment equipped with the newest technology in highly specialised laboratories and learning spaces. The emphasis throughout the building is on openness and accessibility, putting learning 'on show' and allowing students and visitors to observe activities in laboratories and training areas.

PARK HOUSE GRANGEGORMAN LIBRARY

The Grangegorman Library, located in Park House on the North Circular Road entrance to the campus, caters to students based in the Central and East Quads. Students can access collections in Art & Design, Culinary Arts, Electronic/Electrical Engineering, Environmental Health, Hospitality & Tourism, Law (including Criminology), Media, Music and Drama, Sciences and Health, and Social Sciences.

Park House is also home to our Academic Writing Centre, Career Development Centre, Disability Support Service, and the Maths Learning Centre.

RATHDOWN HOUSE - STUDENT SUPPORTS AND SERVICES

In addition to housing a large 250-seater canteen, Rathdown House is a one-stop shop for student queries, including Admissions, Registrations, Exams, International Office and Access & Civic Engagement.

Rathdown House is also home to the Student Wellness Centre, where students can see a doctor or nurse free of charge. The Centre provides a holistic approach to health, including on-campus healthcare and specialist clinics, incorporating physical, psychological, and social aspects of your health and well-being.

Our Counselling Service, also located in the Student Wellness Centre, is available to support you with any problem or experience that affects your ability to concentrate on college work or to enjoy life as a student. Our team of professional counselling psychologists and psychotherapists is available to support students' experiencing personal and emotional difficulties, relationship and family problems and a range of other mental health challenges.





LOWER HOUSE

In 2017, TU Dublin began an ambitious project to bring the oldest building on the campus back into use. The Lower House, which opened in early 2021, is an important part of the new University campus and will offer a range of services for students. There is a large dining area, while the building also provides Student Union facilities and a dance studio and indoor sports areas. There are 18 music rooms for TU Dublin Conservatoire complementing facilities in the East Quad. The Lower House is linked by way of a beautifully landscaped walkway to the East Quad.

Sports

TU Dublin Sport will offer a range of fitness classes and small group training in Mills Bodypump, Les Mills GRIT, HIIT, Pilates, Kettlebells, Met-Con, and so much more. There will also be a state-of-the-art indoor cycling studio featuring the new Keiser M3i model. With this bike, you can transmit your workout data to your phone, smartwatch, or tablet to maximise your workout.

Societies

The Lower House will be home to a range of TU Dublin Societies and Dance, Theatre and Music activities, which will take place in the Common Room on the first floor. There is also an event space on the second floor that will host Social Occasions, Masterclasses, Film Screenings, Gaming Tournaments, Performances, Exhibitions and Volunteering events.

Students' Union

TU Dublin Students' Union is also based in the Lower House, occupying the TU Dublin Students' Union Common Rooms on the ground and first floors. Here they will host Workshops, Panel Discussions, Cultural Celebrations, Tournaments, Comedy Nights, Film Screenings, awards ceremonies, class meetings, and much more!

TU Dublin Conservatoire

The Lower House also contains 18 music practice rooms complementing the Conservatoire's extensive facilities in the East Quad.



OUTDOOR SPORTS FACILITIES

TU Dublin Sports Facilities at Grangegorman won top National Quality Standard (NQS) awards from Ireland Active, the national governing body for Sports and Leisure Facilities. It is the third time in four years that TU Dublin facilities achieved the top awards, ranking them in the top 10% in the country. Grangegorman facilities include,

- → Pitch 1: Full-size natural turf soccer & rugby pitch
- → Pitch 2: Full-size natural turf GAA pitch
- → Pitch 3: Full-size synthetic soccer pitch
- Pitch 4: Synthetic surface. Three Tennis courts, hockey & soccer training area
- Four changing rooms with four shower blocks, male & female toilet blocks

Just a couple of Luas stops away from Grangegorman, TU Dublin also has the following Sports facilities in Broombridge:

- ➤ Full-size synthetic GAA pitch
- Marked for two synthetic soccer pitches across GAA pitch
- Four changing rooms with showers
- Two additional dry changing rooms
- Referee changing room

FUTURE PROJECTS

The next phase of development at Grangegorman will see another three new academic buildings - the Academic Hub & Library, West Quad and FOCAS - constructed by 2023 and will bring the campus student population to 15,000.

At TU Dublin, we are proud to welcome a diverse student body from a wide variety of backgrounds. We foster and embrace students with different abilities, dreams and talents, and allow them to come together to look at future world challenges from unique viewpoints, bringing with them their own lived experience to university.


TU Dublin provides a unique range of disciplines and programmes, with opportunities to study at all levels from apprenticeship to PhD. We offer progression opportunities ranging from level 6 (Higher Certificate) to level 8 (Honours Degree) and onwards.

TU Dublin welcomes students from a variety of pathways, some coming straight from Leaving Certificate, some from FET or QQI programmes while others come through the mature student route. One thing these students all have in common is the vast range of options available to them. When applying to TU Dubin for the first time there are three levels to consider:

Level 6 Higher Certificate (normally 2 years, full-time)

Level 7 Ordinary Degree (normally 3 years, full-time)

Level 8 Honours Degree (normally 4 years, full-time)


When choosing a course, we would encourage students to think about the career that they want or the area they would like to work in. When they have decided on that, it is then time to start working backwards by looking at the courses that are available in that area and to figure out how they will get to where they want to go.

For many leaving cert students, the only route of entry they will consider is directly into a level 8 Honours Degree course. For others, the idea of a more flexible education is more suitable; an education where they can decide to continue to the next stage or to exit after two or three years, returning at a time in their life that better suits to continue their studies.

Some students will have their mind set on a particular level 8 course, and therefore never explore the level 6 and level 7 options open to them. There are also many students who are undecided on what course to choose. We recommend that all students explore the broad range of level 6, 7 & 8 courses that are available in their area of interest.

On their CAO application students can apply for up to twenty courses – ten on the level 8 list and ten on the level 6/7 list. If students only complete the level 8 list on the CAO, and skip the level 6/7 list, they will, in effect, half their chances of getting an offer of a college course.

There are many benefits to including level 6 and 7 courses in your CAO choices. Firstly, the points are often less than their level 8 equivalent. Secondly, successful completion of a level 6 or 7 course can lead to advanced entry into year 2 or 3 of a linked level 8 course within the university. Another plus is that Level 6 and 7 courses tend to be shorter in duration (2/3 years), which can be useful if a student is undecided on their course choice and don't want to commit to a four year Honours Degree course from the outset.

Here are some scenarios to help you understand how this works.



PAUL OUR BUDDING MARKETEER

Paul's older brother works in the marketing department of a large multinational company here in Ireland. Paul really likes the sound of the job and wants to do the same.

The company run a graduate programme, accepting students with an honours degree, so when filling out his CAO form he lists the Level 8 marketing degree at TU Dublin the same as his brother.

Paul is feeling confident about his Leaving Cert results, he has worked hard and is quietly confident he will get the grades he needs. When results day arrives, his maths grade has let him down even though he has more than enough points, he is so disappointed.

Fortunately, he filled out all of his options on his CAO application. On offer day, he has a choice between his 6th place choice at level 8 and his 1st place choice at level 6/7. The level 6 offer is in marketing the area he wants to study and work in. He had not really thought outside of a level 8 course, but here he is now with an offer at level 6 in the area he loves.

He talks to the TU Dublin admissions team who advise him that if he attains a grade average of 55% or above over the two years of his level 6 course he can move into third year of the level 8 course and finish his college career with a level 8 in marketing. Paul is delighted and accepts the level 6 course; he can now see a clear pathway to achieve what he wants, even if it is not what he had originally wanted.



GEMMA OUR BUDDING CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATOR

Gemma has been crazy about science ever since she got a surprise gift of a chemistry set for Christmas when she was 9; she really wants to be scientist.

Gemma's mother is a Garda, and really loves her job. Gemma thinks she might like it too but also loves science so much she cannot decide. Her Guidance counsellor suggest forensic science where she could work on criminal investigations and immediately she knows this is the career for her.

She checks out the options and decides she wants to study DNA and forensic science at TU Dublin, a course that is available at both level 7 and level 8. Gemma works hard for her leaving cert, but unfortunately falls just short of the points she needs for both the level 8 and the level 7.

Her Guidance Counsellor had suggested that Gemma also look into the QQI route, this would allow her to study a science programme to prepare her for college but also to help her decide if this is what she really wants.

She takes up a QQI programme, she loves it so much she finds it easy to get 6 distinctions. She applies to CAO again this time with her QQI results, she is offered the level 8, Gemma is delighted and immediately accepts her place; it has taken her a little bit longer than she initially planned but she also feels much more prepared for the programme





Over 90% of TU Dublin students use sustainable methods (public transport, walking or cycling) to get to University, and the four free apps listed here can make it even easier for finding your way.



The Journey Planner App from Transport for Ireland provides journey planning, timetable and travel information from all public transport providers across Ireland. Download the 'Real Time Ireland App' which integrates all real time arrival information from Dublin Bus, Bus Éireann, DART, Iarnród Éireann and Luas services.



For travel by bus, Luas or Dart, get a Leap Card for convenience and to save money. Remember, you can save even more if you use a Child Leap Card until you turn 19! You can top up your leap card with your phone.



Download the Cycle Planner app or view online to find the best cycling routes in Dublin. If you're new to cycling or getting out on the bike after a break, the app will find a route that avoids roads with heavy traffic. It also avoids difficult turns at busy junctions to help you get comfortable cycling your bike around town.



All Irish taxis can be verified by using the TFI Driver Check app to make sure the taxi you are taking has been registered. The app also lets you email a friend with your trip details.

TU Dublin is one of the most accessible universities with public transport links and regular services to all campuses.







ON YOUR BIKE!

1 in 10 TU Dublin students cycle to college and it's a great way to keep fit and save money. Below are some tips for cycling around Dublin

- Use the Transport for Ireland Cycle Planner app to identify the shortest, safest route to your campus.
- Get a good lock. It should cost 10-20% of the value of your bike and learn how to lock your bike securely. The 5 minute YouTube video "Bicycle Security in Dublin" is a very good tutorial on bike-locking and could save you a lot of money.
- 3. Most TU Dublin sites have secure bike racks and onsite showers for cyclists. If you don't want to invest in a bike, membership of Dublinbikes costs €35 per year, and most TU Dublin sites are convenient to a Dublinbike stand. www.dublinbikes.ie

ON THE BUSES!

All of our locations are serviced by several bus routes, which are too numerous to list here, so we recommend you find the best bus route using the Dublin Bus website: www.dublinbus.ie. Dublin Bus also have a fantastic app with real-time information which says when your next bus is due, so you don't have to wait at the bus-stop for too long!

Bus Eireann:

Bus Eireann, serves TU Dublin Campus locations from towns and cities in the greater Dublin area and surrounding Counties. The service is frequent and reliable and makes TU Dublin easily accessible from the likes of Ashbourne, Cavan, Carlow, Dundalk, Drogheda, Kildare, Kells, Mullingar, Naas, Navan, Portlaoise, Trim and Tullamore.

Private Providers:

There are also several private providers such as Matthews Coaches (Dundalk), Collins Coaches (Monaghan), Dublin Coaches (Kildare Village).

Go Ahead:

A number of bus routes in Dublin are now operated by Go Ahead Ireland, on behalf of Transport for Ireland. www. transportforireland.ie/go-ahead-ireland

139:

The 139 orbital bus route operates between Naas and Blanchardstown and connects the campus to Naas, Sallins, Clane, Rathcoffey, Maynooth, and Leixlip; the route also includes Blanchardstown Shopping Centre.

Shuttle Bus:

A service runs from Coolmine Train Station and Blanchardstown Shopping Centre to the Blanchardstown campus.

LUAS, DART and IRISH RAIL

Luas Green Line serves TU Dublin at Grangegorman, Bolton Street and Aungier Street.

Luas Red Line is convenient to TU Dublin at Tallaght, Bolton Street and Grangegorman www.luas.ie

Irish Rail and Dart stations at Heuston Station, Broombridge, Connolly Station, Pearse Street, and Tara Street are in walking distance or have easy bus and Luas connections to all city centre campus locations. www.irishrail.ie



1 in 10 TU Dublin students cycle to University



Dublin is a vibrant and busy destination. However, it is a relatively small city so student accommodation is in demand. If you are from outside Dublin one of the things you will need do is find somewhere suitable to live, and we have some tips to help make the process a little easier.

TALK TO OUR STUDENT PAD EXPERTS

Many students are not familiar with Dublin so one of the first things they should do, is check out the TU Dublin StudentPad - see tudublinstudentpad.ie/Accommodation. This will help them find the most suitable locations for their campus.

Our campuses are spread throughout Dublin in Blanchardstown, Tallaght and the City Centre, and you can save time and transport costs by choosing an accommodation close to your own campus.

For example, the suburbs of Cabra or Phibsborough are closer to Grangegorman and Bolton Street while accommodation closer to a Luas stop is more suitable for the Tallaght campus. We also recommend Google maps to calculate the best or cheapest routes for you.

GENERAL ADVICE FOR STUDENTS FOR 2021/22

Owing to the impact of the COVID-19 virus, choosing accommodation to suit your own needs is important.

Student Hubs are the ideal choice of accommodation, especially for international students and those wishing to reside in Dublin full time.

STAYING IN A STUDENT HUB

If you like to be close to the action, campus style accommodation may be the option for you. TU Dublin has block booked bed spaces with some external providers of campus style accommodation. You can find more information about these providers on TU Dublin StudentPad - see tudublinstudentpad.ie/Accommodation.

NB. Do not pay a deposit on any private rented accommodation until you have seen the accommodation in person or have asked someone known to you to visit the property.

HOST FAMILY ACCOMMODATION

Host family accommodation is ideal for those on a budget and those who do not need to reside in Dublin full time. Host family accommodation is available on a five and seven day basis and now, some homeowners are offering accommodation for fewer than five nights, to facilitate a reduced timetable.

Host family spaces average €140 per five day week, and students pay rent for fewer weeks than in Student Accommodation. Of all the accommodation options, this is the most economical, and offers the most flexibility. Bills are included in the cost, and many hosts provide optional extras such as a light breakfast and evening meal. In addition, students can opt for a five-day rental agreement if they plan to return home for the weekend. Rent in host family accommodation is typically paid for 25-30 weeks over the academic year, whereas in campus-style student accommodation the rent is typically paid for 40 weeks.

Host families advertise on the StudentPad - see tudublinstudentpad.ie/Accommodation.

PRIVATE RENTED ACCOMMODATION

You might prefer to live in a shared property with friends, and the best place to search for this type of housing is on daft.ie. When you find a suitable property, make sure you get your landlord to confirm, in writing, the length of your lease, the conditions you must meet to get your deposit back, who to contact if anything goes wrong and how much notice they need before you leave the property. Make sure you get a receipt for all money paid, avoid paying in cash and when you move in, take photos of any damage, so you don't get charged for it when you leave.



Unibuddy at TU Dublin

Unibuddy is an online peer to peer live chat platform which allows prospective students to ask a question of our current students. It gives you the chance to chat to them about their student experience and you will be able to connect with different students from across a wide range of programmes at TU Dublin.

We know it is a very daunting time and selecting the correct course can be challenging. Our Unibuddies are here to assist you with your decisions and can provide you with more detailed information about your course choice, what it's like studying at TU Dublin, and information about student life on our campuses. It's a great way to learn what it's really like to be a student at TU Dublin.

Each year Learn+Work students spend 5 months in full-time study and then 7 months on placement with a company 4 days per week, returning to university one day per week during term time. Students are paid while on placement, a minimum of €180 per week.

Aaron Clancy a current student of Learn+Work in Process Instrumentation and Automation believes "This course has given me the opportunity to kick start my career in the industry. Not only am I studying in University but I also get workplace experience for 7 months each year. This means that I will graduate with my university qualification and have 21 months of great work experience on my CV".

Companies hire and mentor our Learn+Work students so that they have the relevant experience needed to work full-time in industry after graduation. Some of our current placement companies include Microsoft, Intel, Vodafone, Citrix, Bristol-Myers Squibb, and Alexion.

Applicants are welcome from leaving cert students, students with QQI-FET qualifications or mature learners (over the age of 23 years on 1st January). Prospective students should apply online through the CAO and will be required to undertake an aptitude test and interview.

Rochtain ar Phrintíseacht Access to Apprenticeship

The Access to Apprenticeship programme is an innovative programme that supports the transition of young men and women (16-24 years old) from areas of socio-economic disadvantage into craft apprenticeships. It is has been successfully running since 2017 and 65% of students have progressed into apprenticeships.

The programme provides an opportunity for young people to sample a range of apprenticeships in Construction, Engineering, Electrical, Motor and Aviation industries, prepare their CV and interview skills, undertake two weeks work experience and complete Health & Safety training. As part of the programme we also run weekly employer engagement events.

A 12-WEEK COURSE THAT RUNS 3 TIMES A YEAR IN SEPTEMBER, JANUARY AND APRIL.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- ~ Aged 16-24
- Minimum of grade D in 5 subjects in the Junior Certificate or equivalent

ACCESS CRITERIA – (3 required)

- Parent(s) or Guardian(s) have not gone to college (Higher Education)
- Applicant has attended a DEIS school
- Applicant is in receipt of a medical card
- Live in an area of disadvantage
- Income Verification €45,790 (P21 and/or DSP Form and/or Self Assessment)
- In care or have been in care of the state

Scholarships

TU DUBLIN FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS & AWARDS

TU Dublin Foundation is an independent registered charity established in 2001 to advance the mission of TU Dublin and thereby facilitate an innovative, responsive and student-centered teaching and learning environment for a diverse range and level of programmes to students of all ages and backgrounds.

Thanks to the generosity of alumni, individuals and partner companies, TU Dublin students continue to receive transformative support through awards and scholarships across a range of disciplines. In 2020, a total of €193,939 was awarded to 85 students through 23 funds and scholarships. The growth in scholarships has been driven by the Foundation's increase in activity and donor engagement. Scholarships and awards celebrate the hard work, dedication and passion of our students. They allow individuals to focus on achieving excellence in their fields while also giving them an opportunity to build valuable relationships to enhance their career prospects. Often, such awards include internships and work experience where students can apply knowledge and concepts learned in the classroom to the practical demands of the workplace. Scholarships, awards and bursaries can have a significant impact on the lives of the student community.

TYPES OF SUPPORT

Scholarship: Usually based on an interview and criteria agreed with the donor, tending to focus on academic engagement and financial need. These are usually awarded with a sum of €3,000, intended to be used for university fees.

TBLIN OF SOME OF SOME

Award: Usually based on merit, awarded directly to the best student or project etc., the award can vary between €500 - €1,000.

CURRENT SCHOLARSHIPS & AWARDS WITH TU DUBLIN FOUNDATION:

Our current Scholarship & Award Programmes cover a range of disciplines in the School of Arts & Tourism, the School of Engineering & Built Environment and the School of Science & Health.

APPLYING FOR A SCHOLARSHIP

While some scholarships are based on academic performance, some are based on need/impact, and some are based on the personal journey and passion of a student. In most cases, students are required to fill out an application form and complete a personal statement or essay. In other cases, students may be required to submit a portfolio (for example in Fine Art, Architecture, and Architectural Technology). The majority of scholarships and awards require shortlisted students to complete an interview with a panel of internal and external representatives.

WHAT AGE DO I NEED TO BE?

To be classified as a mature student, you must be 23 years of age or older on or before 1st January in the year you're applying. You must also be an Irish/EU citizen.

You make your application for admission to the first year of any undergraduate full-time course through the Central Applications Office (CAO).

SUBMITTING YOUR APPLICATION

You will apply through the CAO, some of the questions you will be asked will include:

- Details of your schooling
- Any further education you may have completed
- If you are currently studying, details of these studies
- Information about your work and life experience
- A personal statement about how these relate to your application

You will be asked to send any supporting documents you may have (transcripts, certificates, etc.), by post, clearly marked with your application number, directly to the CAO. These documents will be scanned and added to your online application. Our Admissions Team will be able to access and assess them.

CAO applications must be submitted before the $1^{\rm st}$ February each year.

Inbhuanaitheacht Sustainability

We all now realise that true sustainability permeates into everything. At TU Dublin we aim to help our students progress along this path in an applied and practical manner. It will be through the course you choose to follow, you'll increasingly see it around you, and you will have opportunities to actively participate and progress sustainability issues yourself while you are attending TU Dublin.

By 2023 all TU Dublin programmes will have sustainability as a learning outcome and every learner will engage in practice based research. Lecturers are including issues relating to sustainability in their modules and curricula are being formally modified when under their periodic reviews. In the last academic year over 1,750 of TU Dublin students took the Sulitest (a global on-line sustainability assessment test). All TU Dublin programmes have Problem Based Learning (PBL) aspects, from continual assessments right through to final year projects and dissertations. Increasingly such work is requiring assessing and addressing issues that relate directly to themes and topics on sustainability.

Decisions as to how the University operates are also increasingly been driven by themes and topics directly relating to sustainability. In terms of our energy use, TU Dublin operates under the internationally recognised ISO50001 (Energy Management) framework. Every year,

facilities are improved that help you get to and from each campus in a smarter and more sustainable manner. Likewise, continuous improvements are being made with regards to areas like waste & litter, biodiversity, water & its conservation, and procurement. The Green Campus Committee, made up of students and staff, is looking to develop 'Green Teams' for each campus and major locations, where pilots and initiatives can take place at a local level and, where successful, can be emulated across the University.

Some of the University's clubs and societies are close to sustainability, like the EPS (Environment & Planning Soc.) who have been main drivers of our extensive Green Week activities. Other societies participate in other ways. The Arab Soc. have joined with the SVP Soc. to put on fantastic sustainable Fashion Shows in Aungier St.

In summary, TU Dublin integrates sustainability though many modules and projects. University activities will have a growing sustainability oriented aspect to them. And you will have opportunities to enhance your University experience by becoming active and participating, through local Green Teams and through the University's societies and clubs. 
